We will do this through the Word, Liturgy, Sacrament, Music, Ecumenism, Evangelization, Religious Education of our Children, Prayer and the Honoring of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We will deepen our knowledge, skills and understanding of our Faith. We will be Faith based. Above all, we will foster Love by example and serve the needs of others to work towards economic and social development for all people.

A message from Fr Juan C. Gavíría

This Sunday, called Palm or Passion Sunday, is the first day of Holy Week. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday are called the Triduum, three days that are the highlight of the Church year. There are two Gospels proclaimed at today's Mass. The first Gospel, proclaimed before the procession with palms, tells of Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem. Riding on a borrowed colt, Jesus was hailed by the crowds as they shouted blessings and praise to God. This event is reported in each of the four Gospels.

Luke's Gospel is the only one to report the exchange between Jesus and the Pharisees as Jesus enters Jerusalem. Jesus' response shows that this event, and those yet to come, are part of a divine plan. We hear this echoed again in Luke's description of the Last Supper when Jesus speaks of Judas' betrayal, saying that the Son of Man "goes as has been determined."

At the Liturgy of the Word on this Sunday, the events of Jesus' passion are proclaimed in their entirety. In Lectionary Cycle C, we read the passion of Jesus as found in the Gospel of Luke. We will hear these events proclaimed again during the Triduum when we read the passion of Jesus from the Gospel of John.

Throughout Luke's Gospel we see that Jesus' words and actions proclaim the Kingdom of God. This motif continues throughout Luke's passion narrative. Jesus appears to be in total command of events at the Passover meal as he hands over the kingdom to his disciples. He welcomes them to the Passover meal announcing that this will be his last until the Kingdom of God is fulfilled.

As throughout Luke's Gospel, however, the disciples show little understanding of this kingdom that Jesus often announces. Following the meal, the disciples argue about who is the greatest. Jesus takes the opportunity to distinguish the meaning of leadership in the Kingdom of God from the forms of leadership seen in the world.

Jesus initiates a conversation with Simon and predicts his denial. Jesus then instructs his disciples to prepare themselves for the events that will follow. His words reveal an awareness of the challenges that all of them will face in the days ahead. As the disciples and Jesus enter the Mount of Olives, Jesus indicates the importance of the disciples' time in prayer, telling them that through prayer they will be able to face the challenges ahead.

As he prays, Jesus is tested. In the garden, an angel is sent to strengthen him and to prepare him for the events ahead. After this moment, Jesus is again in charge of the events and circumstances.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus is portrayed as active and vocal throughout his passion. When one of the disciples strikes the high priest's servant, Jesus heals the man, an event reported only in the Gospel of Luke. Jesus stops the disciples' protest against his arrest by noting that this is the "time for the power of darkness." Jesus engages and responds when brought before the Sanhedrin; his words speak about the "power of God" that will bring about the reign of the Son of Man. When questioned by Pilate, Jesus responds with just one phrase; yet before Herod, Jesus refuses to speak.

When Luke describes the Way of the Cross and Jesus' crucifixion, he calls to our attention many events that are not reported in the other Gospels. Throughout his Gospel, Luke has paid heed to the women who accompanied Jesus. Now, on the road to Calvary, Jesus speaks to the women who walk with him. Only Luke reports Jesus' words of forgiveness spoken from the cross. And only Luke reports the dialogue between Jesus and the good thief. Finally, in contrast with the Gospels of Mark and Matthew, Luke reports no words of abandonment spoken by Jesus on the cross. Instead, Jesus, in full command until his death, commends his spirit to his Father and takes his final breath.

Throughout Holy Week, we will continue to reflect on the events of Jesus' passion and death. As we meditate on the cross, we ask again and anew what it means to make the statement of faith that Jesus, in his obedient suffering and dying, revealed himself to us as God's Son and brought to fulfillment the Kingdom of God.

Baptism: Parents who wish to have their child baptized need to call the Rectory. Preparation classes are required and are by appointment only.

Sponsors and Godparents: Church law mandates that a sponsor for baptism and confirmation be an <u>active</u> Confirmed Catholic. An <u>active</u> Catholic is a parishioner who is registered, <u>attends</u> Mass weekly, contributes to the support of the church, is in a valid Catholic marriage (if married), and leads a life compatible with Church teaching. **We can only write letters of eligibility for parishioners who meet these criteria.** Mass attendance is confirmed by envelope use. Please call the parish office to obtain a sponsor letter or for additional information.

Matrimony: Couples contemplating this Sacrament must contact the Parish Office at <u>least one year in advance</u>. All couples planning marriage must attend Pre-Cana classes or Engaged Encounter.

Ministry of the Sick: Parishioners who are homebound and would like to receive the Eucharist, please call the Rectory.

Religious Education Classes: For information on Religious Education classes, please contact our Religious Education office at 732-521-1188.

OCIA (**formerly RCIA**): Adults inquiring about the Catholic Church with a desire to become Catholic are invited to call the Parish Office for more information about the Rite of Catholic Initiation of Adults which begins in September and runs through the following Easter.

Una carta de Rev Juan C. Gavíría

Este domingo, llamado de la Pasión, es el primer día de la semana santa. Jueves, viernes y sábado santo son llamados Triduum, tres días que son el punto culminante del ano eclesial. Hay dos evangelios proclamados en la misa de hoy. El primer evangelio, proclamado antes de la Pasión con palmas, nos habla de la entrada triunfante de Jesús en Jerusalén. Montado en un burrito, Jesús es aclamado por la multitud quienes lo bendicen y aclaman. Este evento es narrado en los cuatro evangelios.

El evangelio de San Lucas es el único que reporta el diálogo entre Jesús y los fariseos a la entrada de Jerusalén. La respuesta de Jesús en este evento, muestra que todo es parte de un plan divino. Escuchamos ese eco en el evangelio de San Lucas durante la última cena cuando Jesús habla de la traición de Judas.

En la liturgia de la palabra de este Domingo los hechos de la pasión de Jesús son proclamados en su totalidad. En leccionario C, leemos la pasión según san Lucas. Jesús aparece en total control de los hechos de la última Cena, en la medida en que traspasa las llaves del reino a sus discípulos. Jesús da la bienvenida a la cena pascual anunciando que esa será la última hasta la llegada del Reino de Dios.

Al igual que en todo el evangelio de San Lucas, los discípulos muestran poco entendimiento del reino que Jesús anuncia. Luego de la última cena, los discípulos discuten sobre quién es el mas importante. Jesús aprovecha la oportunidad para distinguir el significado del liderazgo en el Reino de los Dios y su diferencia con el liderazgo del mundo.

Jesús inicia una conversación con Simón y predice su negación. Jesús luego instruye a sus discípulos para prepararse a si mismos para los hechos que vienen. Luego de ese momento, Jesús está a cargo de los eventos y circunstancias que siguen.

En la medida en que Jesús ora, el mismo es probado. En el jardín de los olivos, un ángel es enviado para fortalecerlo, para enfrentar los momentos que vienen.

E el evangelio de San Lucas, Jesús es retratado como muy activo y muy vocal durante toda la pasión. Cuando uno de los discípulos le pega una bofetada a un siervo del sumo sacerdote, Jesús lo sana. Este hecho solo es narrado en el evangelio de San Lucas. Jesús frena las protestas de sus discípulos contra su arresto, diciendo que "este es tiempo del príncipe de las tinieblas." Cuando Jesús es interrogado por el sanedrín, El habla del reino de Dios. Cuando se le cuestiona por parte de Pilato, Jesús responde con solo una frase, pero ante Herodes, se niega a hablar.

Cuando San Lucas describe el camino de la Cruz y la crucifixión, el evangelista llama nuestra atención sobre muchos hechos no reportados en los otros evangelios. Durante el evangelio de Lucas, vemos como el evangelista resalta el papel de las mujeres que acompañaban a Jesús. Ahora en su camino al calvario, Jesús habla a las mujeres que caminan con El. Solo San Lucas reporta las palabras de Jesús sobre el perdón desde la cruz. Solamente San Lucas reporta el diálogo entre Jesús y el buen ladrón. Finalmente, en contraste con los evangelios de Marcos y Mateo, San Lucas reporta las palabras de abandono dichas por Jesús en la cruz. Jesús, en total control de su proceso de muerte, encomienda su espíritu al Padre y muere en la cruz.

A través de la semana santa, continuaremos reflexionando en los eventos de la pasión y muerte del Señor. En la medida en que meditamos es estos hechos, nos preguntamos por el significado de las frases dichas por Jesús. Por medio de su obediencia y sufrimiento, el se revela a si mismo a nosotros, como el Hijo de Dios y lleva a cabo de cumplimiento del Reino de Dios.


