# A message from Fr Juan C. Gavíría

The Gospel for the fifth Sunday of Lent continues to offer lessons about God's mercy and forgiveness. Last Sunday we heard the Parable of the Prodigal Son from the Gospel of Luke. Today we hear not a parable, but the report from John's Gospel of an encounter among Jesus, the scribes and Pharisees, and a woman caught in adultery.

In John's Gospel, the conflict between Jesus and the scribes and Pharisees occurs much earlier than in the Synoptic Gospels. Jesus' cleansing of the Temple in Jerusalem is reported at the beginning of John's Gospel.

In the chapter preceding today's Gospel, Jesus was teaching in the Temple area. Feeling threatened by his teaching and his actions, the chief priests and the Pharisees are already sending guards to arrest Jesus. The guards return, however, without arresting Jesus because they have been impressed by his words. Even more than this, some among the crowds are considering the possibility that Jesus is the Messiah. The chief priests and the Pharisees change their plan. Before making an arrest, they seek to gather more evidence against Jesus by posing a question intended to trap Jesus.

Today's Gospel begins by reporting that Jesus is again teaching the crowds in the vicinity of the Temple. The scribes and the Pharisees approach Jesus, bringing a woman who has been caught in the act of adultery. They put to Jesus the question of what ought to be done in this case.

The Pharisees state clearly that according to the Law of Moses, those caught in the act of adultery were to be stoned to death. Under Roman occupation, however, the Jewish people did not have the authority to execute people; this is cited in John's passion narrative. To answer the Pharisees' question, Jesus must propose an action that will be either contrary to the Law of Moses or contrary to Roman law. The purpose of the question appears to be similar to the question about paying taxes found in Mark 12:13-17. Either answer, yes or no, will support the Pharisees' case against Jesus.

Jesus avoids the trap, however, by offering an answer that was not anticipated by those who posed the question. Jesus, after writing on the ground with his finger, addresses those who stand before him and suggests that the one without sin cast the first stone. Jesus then returns to his writing. This Scripture reading, by the way, is the only evidence we have of Jesus writing. Yet there are no specific details about what he wrote.

We can easily imagine the scene as the Pharisees and the elders disperse, one by one. Jesus has eluded the trap they had prepared. We might also give credit to the elders and the Pharisees who do not, in the end, claim to be sinless and worthy of passing judgment. These Pharisees are not as self-righteous as the portrait found in the parable of the pharisee and the tax collector (See Luke 18:9-14).

Left alone with the woman, Jesus asks where the accusers have gone. With no one remaining to condemn the woman, Jesus (the one who truly is without sin) sends the woman on her way, refusing to pass judgment on her and exhorting her to avoid future sin.

Jesus' response to those who accuse the woman is more than a caution to us about making judgment of others. It is a profound lesson in divine mercy and forgiveness. As sinners, we are all unworthy to judge the sins of others and we would stand convicted by God for our transgressions. Yet Jesus, the one without sin and thus our judge, offers us who are sinners his mercy and forgiveness. Redeemed by Jesus' compassion, we are sent to sin no more and to live in God's love and peace.

"...For his sake I have accepted the loss of all things and I consider them so much rubbish, that I may gain Christ..." (PHILIPPIANS 3:8)

The first commandment says that we should not put other gods before the Lord. **Sponsors and Godparents:** Church law mandates that a sponsor for baptism and confirmation be an <u>active</u> Confirmed Catholic. An <u>active</u> Catholic is a parishioner who is registered, <u>attends</u> Mass weekly, contributes to the support of the church, is in a valid Catholic marriage (if married), and leads a life compatible with Church teaching. **We can only write letters of eligibility for parishioners who meet these criteria.** Mass attendance is confirmed by envelope use. Please call the parish office to obtain a sponsor letter or for additional information.

**Matrimony:** Couples contemplating this Sacrament must contact the Parish Office at <u>least one year in advance</u>. All couples planning marriage must attend Pre-Cana classes or Engaged Encounter.

**Ministry of the Sick:** Parishioners who are homebound and would like to receive the Eucharist, please call the Rectory.

**Religious Education Classes:** For information on Religious Education classes, please contact our Religious Education office at 732-521-1188.

**OCIA** (formerly RCIA): Adults inquiring about the Catholic Church with a desire to become Catholic are invited to call the Parish Office for more information about the Rite of Catholic Initiation of Adults which begins in September and runs through the following Easter.

# Una carta de Rev Juan C. Gavíría

El evangelio de hoy nos sigue dando lecciones sobre la misericordia y el perdón. El domingo pasado leíamos la parábola del hijo pródigo. Hoy conocemos la historia del encuentro de Jesús y los fariseos y la mujer sorprendida en adulterio.

En el evangelio de San Juan, el conflicto de Jesús con los fariseos ocurre mas pronto que en el resto de los sinópticos. La limpieza del templo por parte de Jesús ocurre aquí antes que en los sinópticos. En el capítulo previo a la lectura de hoy, Jesús enseñaba en el Templo. Jesús se sentía amenazado por la presencia de los jefes de los sacerdotes y por los fariseos quienes ya enviaban guardias para arrestar a Jesús. Los guardias no arrestaban a Jesús porque se sentían impresionados por sus enseñanzas. Los fariseos y jefes de sacerdotes decidieron recolectar pruebas antes de arrestar a Jesús.

El evangelio de hoy comienza con el relato de que Jesús sigue enseñando en la zona cercana al Templo. Los fariseos y los escribas deciden aprovechar la ocasión cuando Jesús hablaba con una mujer capturada en adulterio. Ellos preguntan a Jesús que deben de hacer con aquella mujer.

Los fariseos establecen que, de acuerdo con la ley de Moisés, esa mujer debe de ser apedreada hasta morir. Pero bajo el régimen del imperio romano, los judíos no tienen la autoridad para hacer eso. La respuesta de Jesús a dicha pregunta debe de evitar la trampa legal formulada, pues apoyar la ley del imperio lo pondría contra la ley judía.

Jesús evita la trampa, decide agacharse y escribir en la arena y luego se levanta y pregunta a los que no tienen pecados que lancen la primera piedra. Luego Jesús continúa escribiendo. No tenemos evidencia sobre que escribía en la arena.

Solo imaginemos la escena de los fariseos y los ancianos marchando uno a uno. Jesús se escapó de la trampa. Aquellos fariseos no eran tan buenos como proclamaban.

Luego Jesús pregunta a la mujer, a quien habían dejado sola, sobre donde estaban quienes la acusaban. Luego Jesús, quien no era pecador, pide a la mujer que se vaya en paz, sin juzgarla y pidiéndole que no peque más.

La respuesta de Jesús a quienes acusaban a la mujer adúltera nos enseña acerca de la importancia de no juzgar a otros. Es una profunda lección sobre la misericordia y el perdón. Como pecadores, no somos dignos de juzgar los pecados de otros y debemos de pedir perdón a Dios por nuestros pecados. Jesús, quien nunca cometió pecado, es nuestro juez y nos ofrece misericordia y perdón. Redimidos por la compasión de Jesús, somos enviados a no pecar mas y a vivir en el amor y la paz de Dios.

- + The other Fridays of Lent (Mar. 7, 14, 21, 28; April 4, and 11) are days of abstinence.
- + Fasting in the Roman Catholic tradition means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals which together do not equal the size of your full meal. The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59
- + Abstinence in the Roman Catholic tradition means to abstain from eating meat (beef, chicken, pork, turkey, etc.). The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.
